Blog 2020

29th December 2020

It has been an extra-ordinary year, most of which has been spent under lockdown of some sort or another depending on the seriousness of the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have done as much as we can to keep ringing, most of which has been virtual using Zoom and an online ringing app called Ringing Room. We have only managed to ring for church services on three occasions, each with three ringers. This was allowed with approval of the Rector and churchwardens, using guidelines set up between the CofE and the CCCBR, and having carried out a risk assessment to establish what would be deemed "safe".

We did ring for one wedding, when four of us rang in two "bubbles" of two, David and Sheila P and Phillip and Sheila G. This was also allowed under the risk assessment. Sheila and I tolled the tenor for a funeral. Otherwise, the bells have been silent, apart from the regular chiming of the clock and chiming apparatus.

The government was going to ease restrictions for Christmas and the CofE and CCCBR agreed social distancing of I metre. This would have enabled us to ring five bells for the Christmas Eve midnight service. Unfortunately, infection rates rapidly escalated during December and although we could have continued with our plan it was decided that the risk was too high and we cancelled the ringing.

There was some small consolation in that six of us were able to ring 8 handbells for two services on the 20th December. We rang outside and at least made a joyful sound for a short time.

Tower inspection and maintenance has continued throughout the year and the bells are ready for our return whenever we can be there. At the time of writing we are not allowed to ring because we are in a Tier 4 area.

The year started with much promise. Some first quarter peals were rung and ART certificates awarded, then activities suddenly halted on 20th March when the government announced the first lockdown. Since then we have held 76 Zoom sessions, either for a social chat in lieu of our Thursday practices, or using Ringing Room on Tuesdays and Wednesdays to learn new methods and ringing together. (two separate teams). It's not the same, but it has kept us together, helped us learn new things, and has been very enjoyable. On a positive note, eight of us have managed to quarter peals in Ringing Room, no mean achievement given technical difficulties often encountered!

Thank you to all our ringers for your support in these difficult times.

16th December 2020

19th October 2020

Our next opportunity to ring was for the 10.00am service on Sunday 18th October. Ringers were Christine, Sheila and Phillip. All went well and we rang Rounds on three for 10 minutes. Phillip chimed the service bell.

2nd October 2020

Elizabeth de Clare, b. 1293, received the estates of Clare (Suffolk) in 1314. The de Clares had property in Gransden and the advowson to the parish. (the right to appoint a priest).

In 1326 Elizabeth became the Lady Clare, and in doing so inherited great wealth. She presented three rectors to our parish in her lifetime.

She maintained a high character for piety, and love of learning, and in 1338 re-founded University Hall in Cambridge. In 1346 she rebuilt the college (it took on its current name of Clare College in 1856), and the parishes of Litlington, Great Gransden and Duxford were appointed to its maintenance.

Hence our connection with Clare College, which continues as our patron, and with whom we enjoy very close and friendly relationship. Parishioners frequently attend choral evensong in the chapel and occasionally exchange visits of the respective choirs are arranged.

19th September 2020

Although the new simulator was installed in June I have not been able to calibrate it until now. This was because we were not allowed to ring any bells during lockdown. Since being able to ring again, albeit only three or four bells, we have rung for three services and a wedding. The parish had at least heard some bells and so would not take any notice if I rang them individually to calibrate the simulator. I obtained permission from the rector and churchwardens to do this and completed the task this week.

David Bagley, the supplier, had given me some settings, which he said, should be ok for a ring of six similar to ours. I rang each bell with the sim also sounding. The sim struck at the instant each bell struck, the settings were spot on, and much more accurate than the former Saxilby set up we had on only two bells.

The whole exercise only took the time to ring each bell up and down. So now, we are all set to use the sim on all six bells if we wished, but that is a long way off due to the continuing seriousness of the virus pandemic and restrictions on ringing.

29th August 2020

On Tuesday 19th August a second midweek service was held, this time at 6.00pm. We again rang the bells and included a different three ringers on this occasion. David Prest supervised the safe ringing and was accompanied by Sheila Prest and Georgia. Once again, the procedure for ringing safely under the Covid restrictions worked well and the bells were rung for 15 minutes.

13th August 2020

Today, three bells rang out over the parish to announce a church service, the first to be held in Great Gransden parish church for almost five months.

We rang in accordance with our risk assessment and procedure, which is based on guidelines given by the Central Council of church bell Ringers, Public health England and the Church of England. The documents were approved by our Rector the Rev Rachel Blanchflower.

We were excited to be able to ring, even on three bells, and everything went according to plan and procedure. We received favourable comments from parishioners, and we hope to be able to ring for every midweek service as they are scheduled in the coming months. We will also try to make sure that all our ringers are given the opportunity to ring and each session will include a bubble of two ringers plus one other. Philip & Sheila G and David& Sheila P make up the two bubbles.

Ringers today were Sheila and Phillip plus Sue. Next week they will be David and Sheila and Georgia.



5th August 2020

Manufacture of the clapper stays has been completed and they have all been tried for safety. It is unlikely that the new sim will be used in the foreseeable future because of severe limitations on who can access the tower at any one time and duration. However, it is all set to go as and when we are authorised.



Church services are to resume during August in the form of midweek services. We will have two opportunities to ring and have agreed amongst ourselves to share the ringing to enable as many as possible to take part. We have decided to ring three bells comprising a bubble of 2 plus another ringers. This will involve six ringers over two services and we will schedule future services similarly.

25th July 2020

It is frustrating for all of us not to be able to ring in the tower but we are keeping in touch weekly using Ringing Room. This, at least, will help with theory and listening practice. As reported last week, apart from new tail ends and the installation of the sim on all six bells, Phillip has been busy making new clapper stays for all of them.

Those for the treble and second bells were still usable but were only prototypes and had been in service for several years. The new ones are designed on the same lines but made from one piece of wood rather than strips of timber. They look tidier have been made to fit more tightly. The same fixing mechanism has been incorporated, i.e. a small bolt to latch the hinged lock for the clapper, secured by a question mark hook to prevent the bolt from undoing during operation.



No 3 clapper stay was tried on Saturday 24th July when the bell was rung to a quarter peal using the new sim.

19th July 2020

The last three ropes have arrived from Mendip Ropemakers, with their new tail ends. They have now been fitted and the lengths adjusted, just waiting for our return to ringing.

13th July 2020

The suspension of ringing has been lifted, as at 12th July, but only if local circumstances conform to guidelines issued by the CCCBR in collaboration with the Church of England and Public Health England. These can be found here. Services at Great Gransden have not started again yet and we are waiting further information from our rector.

In the meantime, the annual tower clean-up is well under way. The ringing room, clock room and old belfry have been completed. The last room to be done is the belfry.



During lockdown the 6-bell sim has been installed and tested. New clapper stays are being made for all the bells, and a bit more general tidying up of cables is required. We will soon be ready for sim practices, but a lot wioll depend on obtaining permission to hold these within existing constraints.

28th June 2020

Ringers and Singers Safari Supper 2020

Midsummer, and time for our Ringers' and Singers' Safari Supper when members of the church choir and bell ringers enjoy a summer soiree.

Due to restrictions on social gatherings we had to modify our plan for this year. We still had three courses but every family was asked to open their garden and we all had to bring our own food as we were not allowed to share anything.

A clever schedule organised by Sheila G enabled six people to be in each garden for each course after which we moved to a different venue with six different people.

Twenty ringers and singers, six gardens, a heavy downpour followed by a glorious sunset made for a very enjoyable evening, and although we were not able to see everyone it was good to have face to face conversations as a change to Zooming.

25th June 2020

An exciting week!

I have spent quite a lot of time in the tower in recent weeks during lockdown installing our new simulator. Actually, I have been fixing new LED sensors to the bell frame and wiring them into the laptop computer in the ringing room. The equipment was supplied by David Bagley and enables us to ring all six bells "silently" on Abel. Once calibrated we will be able to practice new methods, striking, and practice ringing up and down in peal.

Part of the work involved stripping out the old system which we had rigged up to the treble and second bell, and whilst this has served us well the new system gives us complete flexibility in how many bells and what we ring.

It was a very pleasant afternoon and here is a photo of Phillip using a pointer at a safe distance!




12th June 2020

We have had quite an exciting week between us. We have held our usual two Ringing Room sessions and have had some success in our ringing as well as a lot of fun chatting and working together.

The Tuesday group rang 120's in Plain Bob Doubles and very nearly achieved a 120 Grandsire. So nearly there and with a little more practice will succeed. The Wednesday group did manage the latter. This was the first 1260 Grandsire Doubles for Gransden ringers using Ringing Room. Tricia continues to develop her plain hunting and tenor behind skills and all in all we are making steady progress.

We met on Thursday for our "practice night", this time at 7.30pm. It was formerly at 7.00pm to allow time for the session to finish so that people could clap for the NHS. This weekly event has now ended so we reverted to 7.30pm, a much more sociable time which was easier for several members. So, it was good, last night, for us all to be there, the whole team. It was a delight to be able to say hello to Reuben and to see baby Maya again, just a little over a month old. Great to see Alasdair again, Georgia was able to join us and Susanne made a fleeting visit.

I was very excited to hear that one of them, a 2-minute clip of a half muffled peal rung on 9th November 2013, which I conducted, received a highly commended comment. This can be viewed here.

I also submitted our entry in the 2018 Hunts District striking competition and a clip from a peal at Caxton. Unfortunately, these were not placed, but the judge, Matthew Hilling, said how difficult it was to judge the competition with all bands displaying some lovely ringing.

4th June 2020

This week we have continued our Zoom meetings using Ringing Room and successfully rung 120 Plain Bob Doubles and 60 Grandsire Doubles. A 1:1 theory session was held between Phillip and Tricia to talk about counting places when ringing Plain Hunt. The session also included theory of place notation. This is level 3 theory for Tricia who is at the beginning of level 2 in the tower.

At practice on Thursday Tricia had set a 10-question quiz for us with all the questions having a bell ringing theme. This proved to be more challenging than expected. The highest score was 6 but everyone enjoyed it and the friendly social banter of the session.

Phillip explained that he had written a risk assessment for returning to the tower, although it is expected that this will not be possible for a long time due to social distancing requirements and the high risk of infection in the country at present. A copy will be shared with everyone and Rev Rachel.

29th May 2020

On Thursday 28th we met as usual on Zoom at 7.00pm. On this occasion we had a slide show presented by Phillip which was ringing based but with some local history pictures too. The slides included memories of our ringing outings to such places as Taylor's bell foundry in Loughborough, a visit to Worcester Cathedral and the Severn Valley Railway, a guided tour of Elgoods Brewery in Wisbech and our excellent weekend in Durham a few years ago. We are looking forward to returning to the tower and organising another outing.

Also, on Thursday, the South Cambridgeshire District Council magazine dropped through the letter box and on the inside back cover is a photograph and brief write-up of the Gransden Ringers explaining what they have been doing as a group during lockdown. This, as well as our articles written for Tower Talk and Artworks helps keep ringing in the public domain and advertises our tower in particular.

24th May 2020

On Thursday 23rd May the ringers held their annual meeting online. This had been postponed from the 9th April and as it became clear that the lockdown would continue for some time we decided to hold the meeting via Zoom. All key documentation was send to ringers in advance (as usual), and this enabled a speedy and concise meeting to be held chaired by Sheila George.

The usual business was transacted. The current officers were re-elected, Tower Captain: Sheila George, Deputy Tower Captain: David Prest, Secretary/Treasurer: Phillip George. We discussed tower activities during lockdown, which take the form of Zoom meetings, as previously reported here, and we talked about tower maintenance, which included outstanding work on three tail ends, the visit by Whites just before

lockdown regarding the 5th clapper, and we agreed to purchase a David Bagley system to expand our simulator capabilities.

Matt and Susanne are delighted the announce the birth of their first daughter, Maya, on the 4th May. We send our very best wishes.




We have had several Zoom meetings in the last few weeks, as a team and also in smaller groups or 1:1 meetings.


We have had a couple of attempts at ringing together in Ringing Room with varying success. It has proved difficult as a whole group mainly because we are all using a variety of devices, tablets, laptops, desktops and mobile phones, and it has taken couple of sessions to begin to understand Ringing Room and how best to configure our devices. However, it has been great fun and an opportunity to meet and chat together. The actual ringing has not been successful in a large group.

Working in smaller groups has been much better. A team comprising Phillip, Sheila, Chris, Hazel, David and Sheila met to ring call changes and another group - Tricia, Sue, Phillip, Sheila and our ringing friend Pam Wakeling from Fincham rang Plain Hunt on 5, PB5 and G5, with Trivia covering for the first time. At the time of writing we have two more sessions arranged.

1:1 sessions have also been held between Phillip, Tricia and Sue to cover theory at L2 and L4 in the Learning the Ropes Scheme. These have been excellent and we have really made use of the time to have detailed discussions on the subject. "Homework" has been completed and both Sue and Tricia have now been signed off for their respective theory levels.

We had some very good sessions with more to be arranged.

16th April 2020

As planned, we met on 16th April via Zoom to ring call changes on Abel. I ran Abel on the desktop and, having published a sequence of call changes, everyone in turn made a call and I controlled Abel. This was a very simple idea and was quite fun but everyone had to wait their turn and of course there was no actual ringing. However, it was successful and worth doing.

The main advantage was that we were all able to meet online and have a chat and it is hoped that we can meet again next week with more ideas.

We are all going to be out of practice by the time we return to the tower.

In the meantime, some of us are attending webinars arranged by the Cambridge District. The first was about ringing in Cambridge in the 16th and 17th century. This

was a very interesting presentation given by Gareth Davies. During Holy week we attended a training session on Blue Lines. This was about the structure of methods and was very comprehensively presented by Stephen Burr, the Cambridge District President. Notes from this can be found here. Further presentations are planned to include belfry maintenance and care, and one on conducting.

We will also be holding our own social gathering on Thursday 16th April when we will be trying to ring interactive call changes on Abel, using Zoom. Watch this space.



3rd April 2020

We had talked about designing a logo for ourselves to wear on sweat shirts and the like. Ringers were asked for ideas and one which Sue suggested found favour with everyone. This was developed with input from the band and Rebecca was asked to prepare some artwork for us.

After several iterations a final design was agreed and we placed an order for garments. The clothing arrived in mid March and we planned to arrange a group photograph on the 26th but the lockdown due to Covid-19 prevented us from meeting again. We didn't want to postpone our launch and to overcome this everyone took selfies, and these were compiled into one photographic record.

13th March 2020

We have had a couple of good events this week, starting with ringing for deanery evensong on Sunday 8th March, when there was a joint choir including our own and augmented by St.Neots, Gamlingay and Gt. Staughton. Sheila G had organised tea for the choir after rehearsal and the ringers were able to welcome two visitors from St. Neots and Gamlingay, the Rev Paul Hutchinson, Catherina Griffths and John Boocock. We enjoyed our ringing and were pleased to welcome them to the tower.

This was Tricia's first experience on ten bells and she commented that it was a very much different sound. She managed very well ringing Rounds and Call Changes. Coronavirus

Before practice started yesterday 12th March we discussed the implications of the Coronavirus on our ringing. Guidance from the government today set out steps to be taken in case of illness. At the moment we are not required to carry out social distancing. The emphasis was again made about handwashing. Sanitiser is available for use in the tower. Everyone understands the seriousness of the situation and we agreed to continue ringing until instructed by the government or the church to stop meeting, but that individuals may stay away if they wish.

The following email was sent to the Rector Rev Rachel Blanchflower.

"I want to let you know that during "weekly notices" at bell ringing practice this evening I talked about today's announcement from the government and chief medical officer. Some of the ringers had also seen it on tv.

At last week's practice I emphasised the importance of handwashing before and after ringing and I reiterated this tonight. I reminded everyone that we have sanitiser in the ringing room for anyone to use as they wish.

I also explained that we will carry on ringing as normal until such time that the government or church instruct us otherwise. We hope we will be able to continue but we are aware that the situation in the country will become worse and we don't yet know how our daily lives will be affected.

Everyone understood what had been said and we shared comments on this.

I explained the importance of self isolation if necessary (according to NHS guidelines), or that if anyone felt they didn't want to attend because of the general situation this would be perfectly ok (just let me know).

We have lots of ringing planned at home and away in the coming weeks and everyone is very positive but we will monitor and act accordingly."
